

SERMON STUDY GUIDE

Week of 9.17.23 Exodus 2 // Pastor Joe Valenti

Please note that this guide does not need to be used as-is. Please view the items below as a toolbox as opposed to a road map. You don't have to follow these steps exactly in order or for the allotted amount of time to have a successful LifeGroup study. You may not even have time to get through all of the questions. However, we do think this is pretty good stuff and we hope it's helpful.

CONNECT (10 MIN)

- This week's sermon highlighted the idea of the hero in the context of the Exodus story. How do you define heroism, and who do you consider to be a hero in your own life?
- Some Christian scholars say that all stories point to THE story (the story of Jesus Christ). Share your favorite story and compare it to the story of Jesus.

EXPLORE (45 MIN)

Create Context (10 min):

1. Read Exodus chapter 2 out loud together.

2. Watch the weekly sermon recap video <u>HERE</u> (4:30)

Study & Discussion (40 min)

- At the beginning of Exodus, the Hebrews are still enslaved in what areas/ways are you or have you been enslaved and in need of saving?
 - Emotionally (anger, fear, doubt)
 - Physically (sickness, pain, etc.)
 - Spiritually (your own sin or the sins of others against you)

Where in Scripture to do we find God's response to these potential enslavements?

- As Pastor Joe mentioned, the word translated "basket" in verse 3 is also translated "ark" in Hebrew. It is used in one other story in the Old Testament – in Genesis 6 in the story of Noah and the ark. Read Genesis 46:1-4.
 - What is the significance of the biblical author using this word purposefully only here on the rest of the entire Old Testament?
- Read the following out loud together (if you've already read Exodus 2, just review) and note which details are the same and which are distinct to each retelling of the story:
 - Exodus Chapter 2
 - Acts 7:23-29
 - Hebrews 11:23-27

- Consider the surrounding context of Acts and Hebrews why are the details about the story of Moses being shared in both of these books and how do the details assist us with understanding the book of Exodus more fully?
 - Reread Exodus 2:11-13. Pastor Joe mentioned that the narrator never makes a definitive statement as to whether Moses was justified in his actions.
 - Consider Stephen's retelling in Acts 7. What additional context does this give to the Exodus account?
 - Knowing that there is no one right answer (biblical scholars are split on this), what is your opinion of Moses' actions here? Was Moses in the right acting as an agent of justice; or was he in the wrong, overstepping his boundaries in taking someone's life?
- Read the following quote and answer the question about it below: "The prayers of the people of God have such a key role to play that the Bible can make it clear only by speaking of it in terms we can understand. It, therefore, depicts the unforgetting God as though he were capable of forgetting and depicts our prayers as having the marvelous effect of causing him to remember. Our prayers are so effective and so delightful in his ears, that God condescends to accommodate his eternal, sovereign, providential working to what we can understand, as though to say, 'Oh, thank you for reminding me.'" - Pastor Joe shared the quote above in his sermon on Sunday. In what areas of life have you been neglecting prayer because you don't believe it is this effective?

Heavy Lifting

Reading the Scripture descriptively means interpreting it as a historical or cultural record, describing events and practices without necessarily prescribing them as instructions for current behavior. Reading it prescriptively, on the other hand, involves taking Scripture as a source of moral, religious, or legal guidance, viewing its teachings as applicable directives for one's life today (for more information on prescriptive versus descriptive reading of Scripture, you can visit

<u>https://www.gotquestions.org/descriptive-vs-prescriptive.html</u>). Some passages of Scripture were written by the author to be read descriptively, while other passages were written to be read prescriptively.

• As diligent readers of the text of Scripture who are currently studying the book of Exodus, how are we to determine what to understand prescriptively as instruction and what we ought to simply read and understand as narrative, or story?
