Dhati is the Lead Pastor at Blueprint Church in Atlanta, and also Vice President of Send Network with the North American Mission Board. He also happens to have a biracial marriage and is a great voice on this topic. If you really mean business, buy an extra book or two for a couple friends who are a different ethnicity than you and read it and discuss together.
