
## Jesus is with you During your Storms Mark 4:35-41 Pastor Karlie Hale December 21, 2025

Mark 4:35-41

On that day, when evening had come, he said to them, "Let us go across to the other side." And leaving the crowd, they took him with them in the boat, just as he was. And other boats were with him. And a great windstorm arose, and the waves were breaking into the boat, so that the boat was already filling. But he was in the stern, asleep on the cushion. And they woke him and said to him, "Teacher, do you not care that we are perishing?" And he awoke and rebuked the wind and said to the sea, "Peace! Be still!" And the wind ceased, and there was a great calm. He said to them, "Why are you so afraid? Have you still no faith?" And they were filled with great fear and said to one another, "Who then is this, that even the wind and the sea obey him?"

What does God want you to know about surviving the storms of life?

1.God wants you to know that Jesus keeps His promises. (v. 35)

John 14:1-3

"Let not your hearts be troubled. Believe in God; believe also in me. In my Father's house are many rooms. If it were not so, would I have told you that I go to prepare a place for you? And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and will take you to myself, that where I am you may be also.

Why does God want you to know you can put your trust in Jesus?

2. Because Jesus will give you peace during your storms. (v. 39)

What does God want you to do to survive the storms of life?

3. Practice fearless faith. (v. 40)

Fearless faith - a deep trust in God that allows you to face challenges, uncertainties, and even fear itself, by relying on divine strength rather than personal power.

Joshua 1:9

Have I not commanded you? Be strong and courageous. Do not be frightened, and do not be dismayed, for the Lord your God is with you wherever you go."

Why does God want you to practice fearless faith during your storms of life?

4. So you can truly find out who is Jesus to you. (v. 41)
